Dear Quest Noar Families,

Our program focuses on individual meaning, is based on creativity, youth leadership, and student initiative. Envisioned as a journey of guided learning, peer collaboration and personal exploration, Quest Noar is also an important social and identity-forming resource for our developing teens.

Important highlights in the lives of our students bookend the Quest Noar experience: B. Mitzvah celebrations at age 13 on one end, and Confirmation in tenth grade on the other. Both mark milestones of spiritual, psychological, intellectual and social growth for our community's youngest adult members. Quest Noar celebrates these watershed moments for students. And, we also aim throughout these years of learning to embolden and enrich these life highlights with deep meaning and rich content, connected to the lived experiences of these 21<sup>st</sup> century teens.

It is especially meaningful and long-standing in the Reform tradition to celebrate the Confirmation of tenth grade students, marking their more mature acceptance of the mantle of Jewish life and learning. And all of our students' experiences leading to this "Sinai moment" prepares them to profoundly understand their developing role amongst their people and in our world.

We encourage our teen community's members to celebrate the b. mitzvah of peers by attending the Shabbat service at which the teen leads the community in prayer. We also hope that all  $7^{th} - 10^{th}$  graders and their families will make it a priority to celebrate Confirmation, traditionally on the holiday of Shavuot, in their respective congregations. It is an important annual celebration in the life of our teen communities.

This year, Confirmation at Beth Am is scheduled for the evening of May 16, 2021. KI's Confirmation for last year's tenth graders will be held on Dec. 12, 2020. The Confirmation of this year's tenth graders from KI is scheduled for the morning of May 17, 2021.

We are committed to ensuring a positive experience for your family and encourage you to be in touch with teachers and our directors with feedback, ideas and suggestions as to how to make Quest Noar work best for our community.

Quest Noar engages students in meaningful and intentional Jewish learning while putting student voice and choice at the center.

## • Vision

Our Quest is for our learners to become Jewish adults with:

- A joyful and loving connection to our Jewish community and history
- Competence and confidence in decoding Hebrew and participating in synagogue worship
- An ability to find inspiration and meaning in the study of Torah and the Jewish tradition
- A dedication to Jewish actions (*mitzvot*) and a connection to Jewish rituals
- An understanding of modern and cultural Hebrew words

- A passion for *tikkun olam* (repairing the world) and *tzedek* (justice), both in and beyond the Jewish community

# • Who We Serve and Statement of Inclusivity

Quest Noar is the teen education program for families of Old York Road Temple -Beth Am and Reform Congregation Keneseth Israel--in grades 7-10.

Quest Noar is committed to creating an inclusive environment for all families, respecting and welcoming equally all learning styles, races, sexual orientations, gender identities, family structures, and religious backgrounds. We strive to meet the needs of all learners. If at any time you feel that your family has not been warmly welcomed or we are not meeting your child's needs, please contact the director, so we can address your concerns.

# Quest Noar Student Conduct

Students are expected to behave in a way that allows others to learn and feel safe in order to be in the Quest Noar program. All Quest Noar students and families are expected to handle themselves according to Jewish values and a spirit of inclusiveness. Families will be asked to follow the *Brit* (behavior contract)

Be Studentim Chachamim (thoughtful students) Treat everyone with Hesed (Kindness) Help build our Kehillah Kedoshah (Holy community)

Should an issue arise with regard to class conduct the following steps will be taken:

Initial discussion: The first referral from a teacher will be handled by the director. The director will often contact the child's parents/guardians to seek guidance on what may be impacting the child's ability to participate positively in Quest Noar.

Parent Conference: The second referral from a teacher will require the parents/guardians to schedule a meeting with the director to work together to develop a plan of action to help support a more positive behavior.

#### AT KI Facility (8339 Old York Road, Elkins Park):

#### • DROP OFF AND PICK UP

Students will be dismissed from their learning spaces. Families should arrange a meeting location. The director will stand at the main door whenever possible to supervise dismissal. Students will be dismissed from the Mural entrance.

#### • Weather Related Quest Noar Closing Information

If we are closed due to weather, we will inform you via email, on Facebook and on our website if it is not the weekend. #### AT BETH AM (IN OUR MENSCH LAB FACILITY) (971 Old York Road, Abington):

#### • DROP OFF AND PICK UP

Students should plan to meet their ride at a previously agreed upon location. Convenient options include the carpool line that picks up around the back of the building and the front entrance of the building. The director will stand at the back door whenever possible to supervise dismissal.

#### • Weather Related Closing Information (Sundays at Beth Am)

If we are closed due to weather, we will inform you via email, on Facebook and on our website if it is not the weekend. On Tuesday, if the Abington and/or Cheltenham schools are closed or close early, we will automatically be closed. #### FOR ALL STUDENTS:

#### EARLY AND LATE PICK UP

- If you need to pick your child up early, a note is requested for the teacher to have your child meet you at the office.
- If, in an emergency, you are going to be late picking up your child, please notify the facility office so that someone can be there until you arrive. Rabbi Tornberg can be reached on her cell phone (347-216-1547) after hours for pick-up related issues.

#### DRESS

 Students are asked to dress in a way that is conducive to learning and reflects the fact that they will be entering synagogue chapels and sanctuaries for Tefillah. Students wearing clothing with obscene language or other inappropriate content, or clothing that does not reflect modesty will be given a JQuest t-shirt to wear. If a student is dressed inappropriately for an on-line session, they will be asked to change.

All students are encouraged (but not required) to wear head coverings, such as a kippah for their time engaged in sacred learning.

#### TZEDAKAH

- All students will be asked to bring in tzedakah (money for those that have less) to each class session. They should contribute each time they come to learn – the amount does not matter. When we are not able to be in class in person, families are encouraged to collect funds on Shabbat and periodically decide on a recipient of these funds.
- If you have occasion to stop by your synagogue, please bring by some canned goods for those in our community struggling with food insecurity.

#### ELECTRONICS

• Students can bring devices to access the internet which may be used, at times, during class sessions for educational purposes. Electronics should remain off and in student bags until they are invited to use their electronics.

- At no time is Quest Noar or any of its participating synagogues responsible for any electronic devices that students bring; any electronic devices brought to Quest Noar is at the students' own risk. Should a student be using electronics when not given permission, the teacher will store the device and a parent will be notified.
- Students will have access to electronics during Quest Noar (computers and iPads). Students will be expected to follow the *brit* (covenant of behavior), treating them with care and using the electronic devices for the learning purposes intended.

#### FOOD

• On Tuesdays there will be pretzels, cheese sticks, and apple chips for sale at Quest Noar before class begins. Due to allergy considerations, we ask that you do not bring food to Quest Noar, including on birthdays and special occasions.

#### Amanda Sham Resource Center for Special Needs

 Beth Am is committed to excellence in education and a belief that all Jewish children are entitled to learn about their heritage. We are proud to offer support through the Amanda Sham Resource Room for Children with Special Needs. We understand that children utilize different modalities to learn and progress at various speeds. The Resource Center, staffed by experienced special education professionals, will utilize progressive and innovative teaching techniques with a diverse scope for our entire school population. #### Shabbat Service Attendance

- Students in grades 3 through 7 are required to attend a minimum of four

   services, all of which must be Shabbat services. Two services must be
   at Beth Am and two may be elsewhere with a note from the parent with
   date of the service and the name of the synagogue. One year prior to b.
   mitzvah, students must attend eight (8) services (depending on b. mitzvah
   date see B. Mitzvah Manual). When Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur,
   Sukkot, and Simchat Torah take place on Shabbat, these Shabbat
   services <u>will not</u> count towards the service requirement.
- Our Shabbat service attendance policy aims for children, along with their parents, to have the opportunity to practice the rituals and traditions taught in our Mensch Lab. This type of enriching experience permits our children to better understand what it is to be Jewish, and, also helps our children develop a connection to our worship services. You are strongly encouraged to attend with your children.
- **Policy:** Students will attend <u>at least two</u> services before receiving their b. mitzvah date <u>and</u> student(s) will have attended <u>four services</u> prior to beginning b. mitzvah training. All students will complete the remaining service requirement by the end of the Mensch Lab year.
