Linda Nesvisky received her BFA from the University of Pittsburgh, where she also did post graduate studies in art history. She studied studio art at Carnegie Mellon University, and at Bezalel Academy of Fine Art in Jerusalem, studying with Ruth Kaiser, a student of Paul Klee. She studied printmaking both in Canada and Scotland. Juried shows include The Boston Printmakers, Harrisburg State of the Arts, and Arthur Ross Gallery at the University of Pennsylvania. She has exhibited regularly, acquiring many awards, including acquisition prizes from the Ben Shahn Gallery at Paterson University and Temple Judea Museum in Elkins Park. She also has awards from exhibitions at the Haifa Museum of Art in Israel and the Miniature Print Exhibition in Seoul, Korea. Her Book of Job monoprints are in the permanent collection of the Skirball Museum in Cincinnati. She was a member of the Israeli Artists Association and the Muse Gallery in Philadelphia. Her photograph credits include publication in The New York Times, The Jerusalem Report and The Jerusalem Post.

CrispR: EDITING OUR EVOLUTION: REWRITING THE HUMAN GENOME

DR. JAYATRI DAS

As gene editing techniques become more refined, the possibility of changing the human genome is moving from science fiction to reality. What should we do with this power? Many in the scientific community are calling for strict regulations on the use of this technology, while others are excited about the possibilities. Should we create babies who will never know disease? What are the connections and distinctions between treating disease and enhancing physical or cognitive traits? Who gets to decide? The Franklin Institute's Chief Bioscientist Dr. Jayatri Das will share the science behind CRISPR gene editing technology, discuss its current applications, and lead an interactive discussion about the future of human genome editing and its impacts on our society.

Dr. Jayatri Das is Director of Science Content and Chief Bioscientist at The Franklin Institute and an invited Fellow of the Center for Neuroscience & Society at the University of Pennsylvania. She has led development of several exhibitions at the Institute—including Your Brain, a national award-winning exhibit about the neuroscience and psychology of the human brain—and directs in-person and virtual programming initiatives to advance public science education about materials science, nanotechnology, neuroethics and other areas of emerging science and their societal impact.



PETRA JORDAN
THE ROSE-RED CITY HALF AS OLD AS TIME DR. STEPHEN PHILLIPS



Nestled in a mountainous basin in a remote, rugged corner of Jordan lies the magnificent ruins of the ancient city of Petra, recently named as one of the "New Seven Wonder of the Ancient World."

This richly illustrated presentation takes the audience on a virtual tour of this "lost" city that dates back more than 2,000 years. Famed for its rock-cut tombs and monuments, including a Roman theater capable of seating as many as 8,500 people, Petra served for a time as one of the major trading centers of the ancient world. It served also as a backdrop for scenes in the movie, "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade."

Petra was abandoned after a series of earthquakes in about 500 AD and was not "rediscovered" until 1812. As you will see, many mysteries still lay buried in the sands of ancient Jordan.

Our journey also includes stops in nearby Wadi Rum, the spectacular canyon where portions of the famous movie, "Lawrence of Arabia," were filmed, and at Aqaba, Jordan's resort on the Red Sea.


